Friends of Highgate Roman Kiln

This report highlights the outcomes of the Firing London's Imagination: An inclusive approach to the Highgate Roman pottery heritage project in its first year, 2023/2024. Firing London's Imagination project runs from May 2023 to May 2026. Funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, it aims to conserve the 2nd Century CE Romano-British kiln first discovered in 1968 and display it in a newly refurbished visitor centre in Highgate Wood as a focus for community engagement and learning about the rich Roman heritage of the city.



History of the project

In the 1960s, archaeologists working in Highgate
Wood found evidence of Roman activity. They
eventually discovered ten kilns which had been built
there between 50CE and 160CE – almost two
thousand years ago.

These kilns were used by the Romans to make pottery for use in people's homes, such as beakers and bowls. Much of the pottery discovered had a distinctive dark-grey appearance, and became known as Highgate Ware.

One of the kilns was so well preserved that it was lifted out of the ground in 1968. It was first exhibited at the Horniman Museum then Bruce Castle Museum, Haringey until 1997, when most of it was placed in pieces in store.

The Roman kiln was previously stored in Bruce Castle Museum in disassembled sections since the 1990's. In early February 2024, the sections of the kiln were removed for conservation by the specialists in clay and traditional building materials of the Natural Building Centre in Conwy, North Wales.

The fully conserved kiln was returned to Highgate Wood in late August 2024 and was put on display, complete with interim interpretation, within the Woods' information hut, while designs for a new visitor centre are developed.

Construction of replica Roman kiln in Highgate Wood

A replica of the Roman Kiln was constructed by Graham Taylor from Potted History, with the help from volunteers from FoHRK and Turning Earth ceramic studio, Highgate.

This kiln was first fired at Highgate Wood Community Heritage Day on 1st September 2024. A second firing also took place in collaboration with Turning Earth on the 21st September 2024.


